This committee is in charge of community outreach, monthly networking mixers for Residents and Businesses. Fundraising and membership pledge drives maybe some other fundraisers.

The Town Council offers community service grants to individuals and organizations for activities, events, and projects that promote the interests or provide community service to PQ. Grants normally will not exceed \$150. Applications are on the web site and are accepted on a continuing basis. They are considered at quarterly grant review meetings held 30 minutes prior to regular Council meetings. Applicants are invited to make a verbal presentation up to 5 mins long

and answer questions proposed by the Grant Review Committee. There's a very detailed explanation of this on our web site, but to make a long story short, we give away between \$7K-\$11K each year in grants and scholarships, depending on our fundraising success.

Code Compliance: Tom Zarzycki, E: code.compliance.rptc@gmail.com

The goals of this committee include neighborhood preservation and enhancement. Volunteers, trained by the City of San Diego's Code Compliance Department, provide information, answer questions, and process complaints. Regarding complaints, the focus is on municipal code "building" and "vehicle" violations (limited to parking, storage, servicing, selling, and inhabiting vehicles). CC&Rs are often difficult to interpret, out of date, and not enforceable. The committee works closely with the City's Neighborhood Code Compliance Department to process complaints. This committee is also active in the removal of illegal signs and graffiti. These are also municipal code violations. Other services include architectural review and neighborhood clean-ups (performed in cooperation with the City of San Diego). Not sure how active this committee is, how many volunteers there are, or when the last City training was.

The charter of the Health and Education Committee is to promote a healthy environment in PQ for all residents and discuss issues that affect the schools and students in PQ.

Keep the residents informed about current events affecting PQ. To that end, this committee:

- 1. runs and adds content to the Council web site, Facebook, and Twitter pages
- 2. writes a column for "92129 Magazine
- 3. maintains and works to continue increasing the size of our community contact list
- 4. Is considering an online newsletter to potentially include: Council contact info, fundraising, elected officials' updates, crime stats, Planning Board update, sports, Parks & Rec, Schools, Library, Business, other community interest items. Rough sample available.

Banner District:

This committee has been inactive for some time, but is currently ramping up to design new banners for the community and raise interest in local businesses with advertising on those banners. This has the potential to be a big fundraiser. Our current banners are approximately 3 years old. All 80 were purchased by the City. They are faded and need to be taken down. Ralph is trying to get the info on how many we have, how much they cost to replace and hang, vendors, etc. Former Council member TJ Zane has this info. The Council maintains our \$1000/yr insurance policy almost exclusively for this. We've discussed having a contest to design a new banner. Bottom 2 feet would be sold as ad space to businesses in community or even individuals with a message. They should hang for no more than 1 year.

Firesafe Council:

The Firesafe Council is a seasonal group, focused on educating the community and on early detection of wild fires in the Rancho Penasquitos area. During fire season, the Firesafe Council meets monthly at 7PM on the third Wednesday of each month at the Doubletree Golf Resort, 14455 Penasquitos Drive, San Diego, CA 92129. Please inquire about whether a meeting has actually been scheduled before attending.

Maintenance Assessment District:

A Maintenance Assessment District (MAD) is legal mechanism by which property owners can vote to assess themselves to pay and receive services above-and-beyond what the City normally provides. This above-and-beyond service level is called a "special benefit." What the City normally provides is called the "general benefit."

PQ has 2 MADs: PQ East (not sure what areas are included in this) and Park Village (which goes all the way over to Salmon River Rd). Those residents pay into the MADs in property taxes. Money can be spent on what voters approve. For PQ East MAD, it's just median strips and entrances to our community. Park Village MAD has done some tree/brush management in canyons. The MADs are managed by the City in conjunction with local people: Park Village MAD local contact is Jon Becker of the Planning Commission; PQ East MAD is Bill Diehl from Rec Council, Bill (Diehl?) from Planning Board, and Mike Shoecraft from Town Council. Planning Board has documents on how much money is collected for each MAD. The City takes about 35% for managing it.

Rancho Penasquitos Planning Board: Darshana Patel, E: advisory.rptc@gmail.com

The Planning Board is a City entity and does not fall under the authority of the Town Council, but we do have a Council member on the Board. The City Council recognizes one official land use planning group in each community to work with City staff to formulate and implement the General Plan and community plans, and to advise the Planning Commission and City Council on projects. The Board meets the first Wednesday of every month at 7:30pm at the Doubletree Golf Resort, Sandpiper Room, 14455 Peñasquitos Drive. I think we need better communication with this group. I would like to add info from their meetings to our web site.

This forum is comprised of representatives from all San Diego communities that are surrounding, or affected by, MCAS Miramar. The purpose is for the Base to communicate ongoing activities to the local communities and for local communities to communicate activities that could affect the Base.

Budget

Yearly Operating Costs: \$1500-\$2000 for insurance, phones, web site, incidentals

Outgoing: \$7000-\$11000 per year for grants and scholarships, depending on incoming

<u>Incoming</u>: money from the city (approx. \$6K/yr), money raised from Fiesta (\$0-\$5000), and other fundraising.

We hope to make significant changes in the "incoming" money category by re-starting our banner district and soliciting membership or sponsorship from community members and businesses.

Changes to the "outgoing" category might include other community events hosted by the Council, rather than just supplying grants to other groups who host events. We should consider holding back \$2000-\$3000 for new community events that we can host ourselves. This would limit grants and scholarships to approximately \$5000/year.

Fundraising

Things we're working on:

- **banner district**: Our current banners are approximately 3 years old. All 80 were purchased by the City. They are faded and need to be taken down. Ralph is trying to get the info on how many we have, how much they cost to replace and hang, vendors, etc. The Council maintains our \$1000/yr insurance policy almost exclusively for this. We've discussed having a contest to design a new banner. Bottom 2 feet would be sold as ad space to businesses in community or even individuals with a message. They should hang for no more than 1 year.
- **sponsorship/membership drive**: Community Partners distribute flyers to solicit donations from individuals and businesses in town. We will post it on our web site, Facebook, and Twitter, and deliver paper copies to the library and every business in town. Other town councils do this to raise money, so we decided to try too.
- T-Shirt Sales. We should sell these at every event and meeting and on our web site.
- **Fiesta** is an all-hands-on-deck event every year on the first Sunday of May. Work on this event begins approx. Nov.

Event ideas for the future:

They'll provide popcorn for a bit extra. Vote via council web site on what movie to show. Sell popcorn, soda, candy, etc. Potential sponsors get ad space at bottom of screen.

- Community Blood Drive
- E-Waste Recycle Day
- CPR day co-sponsored by police and fire

Council Member Bios

This is a lot of info, so to save paper, please see the web site for this information. In short, the Town Council is made up of elected and appointed volunteers from 8 districts laid out to coincide with the elementary school boundaries. There are up to 2 elected representatives from each district and up to 8 appointed members-at-large. No district may have more than 4 representatives. The council currently has 20 members, leaving room for 4 more.
